CONTENT

Inequality was a neglected topic in economic research for decades. Since 2007 the crisis has brought the issues of the distribution of wealth, income and work time to the forefront. Established inequality researchers like Piketty, Saez, and Atkinson are now well received by the economics profession and by the public. At the same time, the drastically improved data availability provides new opportunities for cutting-edge research in inequality. This opens up a space for young researchers to address the pressing challenges of our time.

For this reason the Chamber of Labour Vienna hosts a conference where researchers at the beginning of their career (Master, preor post-doc) are specifically invited to attend.

Keynote speakers: Till van Treeck is professor of Socio-Economics at the University of Duisburg-Essen, with research interest in income distribution, economic crisis, and post-Keynesian approaches to inequality. Eva Sierminska is an expert on the empirical analysis of wealth and income inequality. She works at the Luxemburg Institute of Socio-Economic Research (LISER) and is a Research Affiliate at DIW Berlin and Research Fellow at the Institute for the Study of Labor.
